It is the physical manifestation of who we are, what we were, and sometimes a template for what we are becoming. This is as true of a street in Brooklyn as it is of an ancient, echoing palace. And for all this, what do we see? Like fish in water we rarely know the texture of the world around us in our rushing daily lives.


In this group exhibition, Charlotte Jackson Fine Art features the work of photographers whose focal point is architecture (both interior and exterior spaces). The perspective and subject matter of the photographers in this show is varied, from the bygone splendor of Versailles to the reconstruction of Beijing, but all have in common an ability to create images that capture our attention. An angle of a building, an empty room, shadows, patterns, aureoles of light: the eye of the photographer captures an intimate part of a world that is rapidly changing. This piece of the world in turn enables the viewer to see what is there, to see differently. An unexpected perspective cuts through preconception and allows for a flash of awareness where seeing can happen.

These diverse images from all over the world (China, Italy, New York, Los Angeles, France) form a kind of conversation of cultures and histories, of time and change. They speak to each other as well as to the viewer, allowing both an interior and exterior dialogue. But do not mistake that these images are only documentary, the act of framing, of catching light and field, go far beyond recording into the realm of art. Viewers are able to interact with the image, to engage it and take from it a changed relationship with the world around them.






